## EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

*At the end of this course participants will be able to:*

- Explain how stress impacts upon the body's allostatic mechanisms, as well as upon drug craving, and relapse;
- Describe the cannabinoid system and discuss the potential for cannabinoid antagonist interventions to alter one's desire for food, nicotine, and drugs;
- Describe the factors that are most important in determining the effectiveness of addiction treatment;
- Summarize patterns of alcohol consumption and alcohol-related health impacts and discuss evidence-based prevention strategies for preventing this risk behavior;
- Describe the function of the opioid receptor;
- List the ways in which behavioral or pharmacotherapies might reduce one's tendency to seek rewards or avoid punishments.

## CREDIT

**Physicians:** This is an activity sponsored by CSAM, a CMA-accredited provider. Physicians attending the fall course (Thursday through Saturday) may report up to 19 hours of Category 1 Credit toward the California Medical Association's Certificate in Continuing Medical Education and the AMA Physician's Recognition Award. ### **B** Dialectical Behavior Therapy: An Experiential Workshop on Engagement and Confrontation.

Successful treatment of dual diagnosis patients requires confrontation and engagement from physicians to keep these complex patients in treatment and to help them address issues they would prefer to deny or avoid. But how do physicians acquire and practice these important skills? ## SATURDAY, OCTOBER 22

### How Pain and Addiction Interact

On this final day, the focus is on the connections between pain and addiction. Chris Evans, PhD – one of the first scientists to clone the opioid receptor – will describe the molecular/ cellular mechanisms involved in pain inhibition and their importance to tolerance and addiction. Peggy Compton, RN, PhD will discuss how the presence of pain might minimize the addictive nature of opioids and, in turn, ways in which addictive disease complicates the pain states. As the COX-2 inhibitors are being removed from the market many patients will resume treatment with NSAIDs. A lecture by Paul Kreis, MD will review the mechanism of action and clinical uses and risks of NSAIDs. In the final lecture of the day, Jodie Trafton, PhD will review theories about the brain's adaptation from seeking reward and avoiding punishment. The implications for early recovery and pain management of learning to use alternative neural circuits will be presented.
